## Call for papers

### **The world of the Amazon rainforest and the Amazon rainforest of the world**

Following the first edition of the International Network for Global Studies Congress (CRIEG 2025), held at the University of Guyana (Cayenne) in December 2025, GLOBAL magazine is launching a call for papers for a thematic edition dedicated to contemporary issues related to the Amazon rainforest.

Far from being a simple "regional object", the Amazon rainforest emerges as a *world-space*, at the intersection between the local and the global, the political and the symbolic, the living and the technical. In this sense, it allows us to rethink globalisation not as an abstract or homogenising process, but as a situated, conflictual and relational dynamic. The Amazon rainforest brings together tensions related to transformations in development models, cultural recompositions, legal, economic and security conflicts, as well as educational, media and techno-scientific changes.

This dossier also aims to analyse the debates and reflections resulting from COP30, organised in Belém (Brazil). This conference, held in November 2025 in the heart of the Amazon rainforest, highlighted key themes for the study of globalisation from the epistemologies of the Global South.

By inviting contributions in the humanities and social sciences that question the forms, narratives, norms, knowledge and practices of globalisation from the perspective of Amazonian realities, GLOBAL aims to contribute to the analysis of how the Amazon



rainforest is reshaping contemporary debates on climate change, social justice, ecological governance, as well as the knowledge and practices of indigenous and riverine populations.

The journal particularly encourages empirical contributions based on field research and case studies that can fuel the debate with original data.

### Areas of reflection

1. Biodiversity, climate and environmental governance
2. Deforestation, extractivism, bioeconomy and sustainable alternatives
3. Indigenous knowledge, decolonial ecologies and environmental justice
4. International mechanisms, climate policies and environmental diplomacy
5. Indigenous peoples' rights and international legal frameworks
6. Security, borders, transnational crime and sovereignty
7. Education for citizenship, fundamental rights and globalisation
8. Hospitality, migration and global humanism
9. Religious syncretism, shamanism and Amazonian beliefs
10. Cultural globalisation, identities and symbolic circulations
11. Literature, philosophy and Amazonian narratives of the world
12. Higher education in the Amazon and ecological transition
13. Intercultural education, ancestral knowledge and decolonisation of curricula
14. Media representations of the Amazon rainforest and new media
15. Journalism, environmental data and socio-environmental controversies
